At last count there were 87 community archives collections awaiting processing and over 50 series of NT Government archives awaiting transfer..... so please be patient. Further advice about the Northern Territory Government's storage of secondary records will be issued shortly.

## ${ m R}$ ecords management strategy

The Consultancy commissioned to recommend a records management strategy for the NT Public Sector will be finalising its work around the time that this newsletter is issued.

During May, Judith Ellis, the principal



consultant working on the project, will be presenting the draft report and consulting with the project steering committee and other appropriate personnel before final release of the report

which will probably be in late May 1997.

The Records Management Advisory Group is eagerly awaiting the report and is optimistic that it will provide some direction and strategies which the Government will be prepared to embrace.

# UPPDATE

#### LIST OF HOLDINGS

At the beginning of April, an updated version of the "List of Holdings" was completed, and is now available for use in the Public Search Room. The new version is current for records processed until the end of March 1997.

The "List of Holdings" is the primary finding aid to the records in NTAS custody, and is divided into three categories - Personal Archives; Archives of Organisations', and Records and Archives of Government Agencies.

Although subject indexing is very difficult with archives collections, two general subject or function indexes have been included for the Archives of Organisations section and the Records and Archives of Government Agencies section.

The List also contains an extensive listing of the Oral History Collection and photographic holdings.



For the first time the List will be available for limited searching by staff on our new local area network.

Copies of the List have been distributed to related organisations in the Northern Territory, including the NT Library, Darwin Public Library, Australian Archives and Alice Springs Library.

The size of the list prohibits further copies being made available, but research inquiries can be made to Andrew Pitt (Archivist, Information Services). Guides to specific areas in the holdings such as mining are also available.


### NT HISTORY AWARDS

Since the last newsletter there have been numerous acquittals of past History Awards and the production of some significant publications, the authors of which had received assistance from the History Awards program.


We congratulate Jan Wositzky for writing a story of Aboriginal Life



as told by Wardaman man Yidumduma Bill Harney. Titled Born Under the Paperbark Tree this book was recently published by ABC Books.


Congratulations are also extended to Jose Petrick who has now published the third

#### COMPETENCY STANDARDS

The national competency standards project for records and archives, which is being under-



taken by the Finance and Administration Industry Training Advisory Body, is nearing completion. The process has been a complex and highly consultative one in which a large cross-section of representatives from all states and territories have participated.

S usan Henry, the co-ordinator of the project, visited Darwin in February to conduct a workshop which involved participants in drafting parts of the Standards. This gave participants a clear and positive view of where the competencies are going.

While it is emphasised that the standards will always be subject to change and updating, we feel confident that they will provide some much needed information to assist in properly structuring a career path for records management personnel in the NT Public Sector.

The Standards are due to be finalised in June 1997.

### PROTOCOLS FOR ACCESS FOR STOLEN GENERATIONS

The NT Archives and the Office of Aboriginal Development are currently negotiating with the NT Stolen Generations Reference Group a Protocol for Access to NT Government Records for Aboriginal people researching their families. This follows past policies of separation of children from their families.

The main objectives of the Protocol are to simplify the process of gaining access to NT Government records which are held across various departments and agencies and to address the issues of gaining access to potentially distressing and personal information.

### DISASTER PREPAREDNESS AND RECOVERY FOR RECORDS

A records disaster encompasses all types of damage to information/records (in whatever format) on a large or small scale. It may be caused by natural occurrences such as flood, fire, cyclone etc or from an internal hazard like leaking pipes, electrical fault or even an inadequate air-conditioning system. What ever the reason, being prepared for a disaster is essential.

#### Be prepared....

When reaction to a disaster is prompt and efficient the effects can be minimised.

Being organised and aware of procedures enhances the likelihood of full recovery. Having a plan in place before a disaster occurs is the best insurance against losing vital information.

....Make a Plan

A disaster plan needs to address all aspects of emergency preparedness from prevention, protection and response to recovery and rehabilitation.

The NTAS has recently issued a new leaflet on disaster preparedness and recovery for records. This brochure covers a variety of aspects from outlining reasons for being prepared and making a plan to items required for constructing a disaster kit.

The brochure has received an enthusiastic response, especially after the recent cyclone season experienced in Darwin.

# COMPUTERISATION PROJECTS

The recent computer upgrades and network development at the NTAS have enabled work on the computerisation of several functions to take a leap forward.

Four databases have been developed using MS Access 95 for the management of repository space, records locations and series registrations.

A Locations Database was developed to manage series consignment storage information to assist in the retrieval of records. The Locations Database replaces a Locations List which was created using word processing software. Although extremely useful during the repository moves, the list was limited in its capabilities. Until 1994, locations were managed solely by a card catalogue which proved impractical and very cumbersome during the first records relocation.

The new database will allow multiple users

to access the location information for greater efficiency, while providing improved control over the holdings.

A complement to the Locations database is the Repository Management Database which replaces the old compactus directories. This database contains information on repository storage down to the box level and will assist in maximising the use of limited storage space.

The two other databases were both designed for the management of series registration information. The previous manual system recorded only basic series information (series number, provenance and description). The new databases contain more fields of information allowing access to greater detail.

The two Series Databases have been developed to deal with record series from two different registration systems. The first is the

system currently used at the NTAS for Northern Territory Records Series (NTRS numbers), using a version of the Commonwealth Records Series system.

The second database is for registration of



records received from
Australian Archives in
1983 when the NT
Government's function
and records were
transferred to NTAS. Control

of these records had been extremely limited until recently, and it is anticipated that the use of this second database will provide greater access to these records.

The reporting and searching capabilities of these systems will allow us to generate a wider range of statistical information about our holdings and their management. The network access to these databases will see greater use of this information for both management and research. I'm sure that this is only the beginning of NTAS' march into the realm of information technology.


There is also a program of evening events, in which Sally Morgan, ABC Radio


